Fresh look at old favourite

RAY Jeffery has again come up with a fresh look to an old favourite with the CAODS production of Gigi.

Opening with an evocative Parisian set and over 40 on stage, the evening promised much. And they

delivered.

The evergreen Peter Smith played the wordly-weary roué Honoré. His voice gets added expression with the passing of the years, and his timing – both comic and musical – has never been employed with greater facility.

Christie Booth was Gigi, and she took full advantage of her youthful exuberance Gigi - Chelmsford Amateur Operatic and Dramatic Society, Civic Theatre

in this production full of set pieces. Her transformation from gawky schoolgirl to elegant lady was a joy to behold.

Nick Court was rock steady as Gaston, the family-friend-with-areputation who eventually realises Gigi's charms.

With the depth of talent CAODS can draw on, there were many excellent performances, and the chorus numbers — an especial favourite of mine in this production — were rich and tuneful. The dance numbers, too, were intricate and disciplined — even the inevitable Can Can had an

unaccustomed air of spirited elegance about it.

Andrew Denyer commanded a fine performance from a small but perfectlyformed orchestra, and the costumes were utterly authentic in style and character.

I was particularly taken with the very slick and highly-organised almost seamless scene changes too.

It is tough bringing something new to tunes that have been done to death, but every number here — and there are many — felt as if they were being performed for the first time.
