Now, being Nathan is Patrick Tucker, with a voice that would shame Schnozzle Durante. Rachel Parsons, as

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Adelaide, proves yet again what a show stopper she is, of that there is no doubt.

Furthermore, John Court, Havana. neighes his way through his part of Harry the Horse and Les Cooper is really big as Big Jule: Andrew Jeffers gives a good version of Sit Down You're Rocking the Boat and the hoodlums of the chorus are very powerful in The Oldest Established and Luck Be a Lady Tonight.

Robin Sampson is Sarah's Grandfather Arvide, and the Hot Box Girls in the night club are wonderfully racous. Costumes are brightly col-

ourful and the final wedding scene with silver costumes is something quite spectacular. Lighting, designed by Robert Warner, contributes to the atmosphere, particularly in

Ray Jeffrey directs this musical fable of Broadway with his usual eye for the visual, most evident in the production numbers.
